

Town Report 2014



This year we would like to “Honor All Who Have Served” and in doing so the first ones that come to mind are our Military Veterans. Thank you to each and every person who has served our country past, present and future and their families. Because of your commitment and sacrifices we have freedom others can only dream of having.

Our cover photo this year is a letter that was sent in 1863 to Samuel Jones by George T. Jones. The image on the cover is difficult to read but the letter reads as follows:

Camp Parapet
Jan 4th 63
Saturday night
Dear Father

I am siting in my camp to night and thot that I would write a few lines whether you will get it or not I do not know. if I keep writing you will be likely to get some of them. the rest of our Reg arived night before last. we haft to drill prety hard now the Lieut Colonel is a experience military man and he is bound that we shall know something before we go back. I surpose that you are having prety cold wether about this time. we had a very little frost last night it was the coldest night that we have had yet. there is a lot of conterbands here our pickets bring them in mostly every day. I asked one the other day what made him run away he sed cas de others did. he sed that he wanted to go north. when we told him that he would haf to work if he did. he thot quer if that was the case. Andy and I got a pas the other day and went and found Dr. Alf. Holt. It was 13 miles to where he was in camped. he did not know that we was round. we took him by surprise. we took diner with him which he liked much. after diner we started back. we past through the city. we past Genral Butlars headquarters. we got back to camp about dark. Alf got on to his horse the next day and road up and saw us – he has been promoted to first Surgen in the 1st Texas Regt. he is heart sick of the war. he says he wishes it was closed up. Jan 5th 6 oclock PM. we have had some pretty hard drilling today. this morning we had orders read to hold ourselves in rediness to start anytime but where we shall go we do not know. some say that we are going to Texas. other say we shall go to Baten Rough. ther was 3 companys of a New York Regt went out the other day and last night they came back. they met 4 Regts of gurilers . they fit them a while and retreated. this place is strongly fortified. there are breastworks thrown up. it reaches from the river back to a swamp some 3 miles and well mounted with big guns. there is a wide ditch on the other side full of water which is imposible to pass with out a bridge. John Butlar was on picket gard the other day up the river about 2 miles there was a shell fired from here and it burst just over his head. the pieces flew all around him but did not hit him. Fred Chase of Weir was on the same place night before last he fired at a man that tride to pass down the river in a boat. Wm Steel and Nathan Harris is in the hospital yet and 4 other ones in our company. we shall probably start tomorrow as our cooks have got to cook all night to prepare 3 days rations. The Lyndeboro boys are all well but Steel and Harris. I must come to a close. I will write as soon as I HAV another chance. Write often and send paper. put on Bancks Division. love to all.

In Dedication of Robert Rogers



Bob Rogers is one of those people who can be described as “helpful” – always there offering his assistance wherever he can, but always low key, never taking center stage and rarely taking credit for what he has done. He has, over the past years, served the town and the school district in many capacities, both elected and appointed, and as a volunteer at the Central School. He is currently Chairman of the Planning Board, a Trustee of the Library and also of the Cemeteries.

Bob has been associated with the town for most of his life. His earlier years and long teaching career were recalled by his long-time neighbor Sally Curran. He started coming to New Hampshire in the 1940s – first to his uncle’s in New Boston and then to his parents summer place in North Lyndeborough (the Alfred Stearns place) in 1945. His parents moved here permanently in 1961. Bob was then attending Bridgewater State College in Massachusetts.

He graduated from Bridgewater in 1963 and got his first teaching position in Greenfield from 1963 – 1965, serving as the teaching principal from 1965 – 67. He then went to graduate school at the University of New Hampshire to become a counselor/special education teacher. He was teaching in Mason when Andy’s Summer Playhouse was formed by a group of teachers under the direction of author/artist Elizabeth Orton Jones. He was the Masenic Middle School counselor through 1976, and then went to Mont Vernon as the special education teacher until his retirement in 1996.

In 1971 he and his folks moved into the Bailey place at the corner of Mountain Road and New Road where he lived until 2002 when he built a smaller house on Cold Brook on New Road where he currently resides

Always interested in history, especially North Lyndeborough and the “over the mountain” section of town, he is a long time member of the Lyndeborough Historical Society and a charter member of the town’s Heritage Commission where he has overseen the Historic House markers.

Using his teaching experience, he volunteered for several years at the Central School to help set up the computer program. He worked with the school’s enrichment program and also assisting with 6th grade math program until just a few years ago.

Bob is a FISH volunteer, driving the elderly or others unable to drive to doctors’ appointments.

Sally said, “I asked him once what he likes best about Lyndeborough and he told me that the beauty of the town goes without saying, but the best part is how we all pitch in to help each other. The town has so many really nice people living here and I love the sense of community. He’s been my friend for 69 years and Lyndeborough’s lucky to have someone so willing to do for the town and give of his time and talent.”

Report of Town Events for 2014



2014 was a year with little controversy, but much introspection. Russ Boland was named town administrator and Burton Reynolds was honored for his years in that position and on the Budget Committee. Former Administrator Kate Thorndike, who retired while on medical leave, was given best wishes for a full recovery.

Lucy Schmidt was presented with the Boston Post Cane at town meeting.

The Police problems seem to have been solved with an out-of-court settlement with former officers. But the town has to repay Wilton \$141,000 because of a state revenue error.

Gov. Maggie Hassen was in town in March, officially opening the state's maple syrup season with The Maple Guys at their new sugar house on Cram Hill Road.

Former Selectman Charles Levesque passed away and was remembered as both a great mechanic and an automobile racer.

It was a year for remembering our history. The Village Common turned 100 with celebrations on Memorial Day. A decorative globe believed to have been made at the Lyndeborough Glass Factory was presented to the town by Beverly Sherman Shea and officially accepted during a successful Community Day in August.

The 1890s clock at Citizens' Hall was relocated and restored. A collection of old deeds was found in the town safe. Maps of the cemetery from 1816 are helping Ginny Chrisenton computerize the records.

A Christmas tree was planted in front of the Town Hall in memory of former Road Agent Earl Bullard by members of this family. Unfortunately, it was vandalized and destroyed before it could be decorated. The donors will try again this spring.

The century-old hand painted stage curtain at the Town Hall is to be restored, a project of the Heritage Commission.

Students and staff at the Central School celebrated their last Thanksgiving feast, an event dating back over 30 years. This fall all of the elementary school students will be attending the new combined school in Wilton. The Central School will become a kindergarten/pre-school as well as the SAU offices.

The new storage facility on Center Road has been repaired and will be put into use when alarm systems are installed.

Work continues on the Village Common with more brush cleared. Additional bricks will be placed by the monuments before Memorial Day.

Progress continues on the restoration of the Center Church. Most of the building has been painted and some windows restored. Work will continue in the spring and donations of all kinds are welcome.

The biggest problem now facing the town is the very expensive upgrade of Mountain Road, with new drainage near Badger Pond to be designed.

And then there was Cornflake the guanaco. Part of a herd abandoned in Hancock, she was rescued and is now residing at Tim and Dana Welch's Purgatory Falls Alpaca Farm.

Town Warrant

**STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE
TOWN WARRANT
LYNDEBOROUGH, NEW HAMPSHIRE**

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Lyndeborough, in the County of Hillsborough in said state qualified to vote in Town affairs; You are hereby notified to meet at Center Hall, 1131 Center Road in said Lyndeborough on Tuesday, the tenth (10th) day of March 2015 at ten o'clock in the forenoon until seven o'clock in the evening, for ballot Voting of Town Officers and all other matters requiring ballot vote; and, to meet at Citizens' Hall, 9 Citizens' Hall Road in said Lyndeborough, on Saturday, the fourteenth (14th) day of March 2015 at ten o'clock in the morning, to act upon **Articles 2 through Article 26:**

Article 1: Selection of Officers

To choose all necessary Town officers for the year ensuing.

Article 2: Town Operating Budget

To see if the Town of Lyndeborough will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of one million seven hundred forty three thousand and sixty six dollars, **(\$1,743,066)**, representing the **operating budget** for fiscal year 2015 as prepared by the Budget Committee. Said sum is exclusive of all special or individual articles addressed; or take any other action relative thereto.

The Selectmen and Budget Committee recommend this appropriation. (Majority vote required).

Article 3: Mountain Road Engineering

To see if the Town of Lyndeborough will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Fifty Nine Thousand Eight Hundred Dollars **(\$59,800)** for the purpose of procuring engineering services on and analysis of Mountain Road and further to authorize the Board of Selectmen to contract with a qualified engineering company for these services, said engineering company to work with the Selectmen to provide to the 2016 Town Meeting a construction proposal for funding of the necessary work on Mountain Road that are outside the scope of the Town Highway Department capabilities. The sum of Fifty Nine Thousand Eight Hundred Dollars **(\$59,800)** to come from fund balance with no amount to be raised from taxation, this is a non-lapsing appropriation and will not lapse until the project is complete; or take any other action relative thereto.

The Selectmen and Budget Committee recommend this appropriation (Majority vote required)

NB: This engineering work entailed in the warrant article shall consist of but not be limited to, discussion at Town Meeting, develop existing conditions plan, geotechnical evaluation, preliminary design, final engineering design, NHDES permitting activities/applications, filing at registry of deeds, and construction cost estimate.

This engineering work will be developed in the following four areas of Mountain Road:

- 1. Beginning at Mason Rd. and extending approximately 1,822 feet to Badger Pond.**
- 2. A 475 foot section at the top of Mountain Rd. between 444 and 462 Mountain Rd.**
- 3. A section known as the ledges near Hunters Cot.**
- 4. The back side of Mountain Rd. beginning west of French Rd. and extending approximately 3,232 feet to the end of the existing pavement.**

Article 4: Police Vehicle Equipment Purchase

To see if the Town of Lyndeborough will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of twenty thousand dollars (**\$20,000**) to be combined with the twenty thousand dollars (**\$20,000**) raised in last year's non-lapsing Warrant Article 3 for a total of forty thousand dollars(**\$40,000**) for the purchase of a new police vehicle, associated equipment and set up costs. This purchase will replace the 2011 4WD police vehicle. This will be a non-lapsing appropriation per RSA32:7 VI and will not lapse until the vehicle is replaced or 2016, whichever is sooner; or take any other action relative thereto.

The Selectmen and Budget Committee recommend this appropriation (Majority vote required.)

Article 5: 1994 Fire Department Pumper Capital Reserve Fund

To see if the Town of Lyndeborough will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of twenty four thousand dollars (**\$24,000**) to be added to the **Repair and Replacement of the 1994 Fire Department Pumper Capital Reserve Fund** previously established for that purpose; or take any other action relative thereto.

The Selectmen and Budget Committee recommend this appropriation. (Majority vote required.)

Article 6: 2005 Fire Department Pumper Capital Reserve Fund

To see if the Town of Lyndeborough will vote to raise and appropriate twenty-four thousand dollars (**\$24,000**) to be added to the **Repair and Replacement of the 2005 Fire Department Pumper Capital Reserve Fund** previously established for that purpose; or take any other action relative thereto.

The Selectmen and Budget Committee recommend this appropriation (Majority vote required.)

Article 7: 1984 Fire Department Tanker Capital Reserve Fund

To see if the Town of Lyndeborough will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of forty thousand dollars (**\$40,000**) to be added to the **Repair and Replacement of the 1984 Tanker Capital Reserve Fund** previously established for that purpose; or take any action relative thereto.

The Selectmen and Budget Committee recommend this appropriation. (Majority vote required).

Article 8: Purchase a New Fire Department Tanker

To see if the Town of Lyndeborough will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of three hundred and fifty thousand dollars (**\$350,000**) for the purchase of a new fire department tanker and to authorize the withdrawal of one hundred and fifty thousand dollars (**\$150,000**) from the Capital Reserve Fund previously established for that purpose. The balance of two hundred thousand dollars (**\$200,000**) is to be received from a Federal Emergency Management Agency Assistance to Firefighters Grant. **In the event that the Town of Lyndeborough does not receive the Assistance to Firefighters Grant this warrant article will be deemed void;** or take any other action relative thereto.

The Selectmen and Budget Committee recommend this appropriation. (Majority vote required)

Article 9: Purchase of Thermal Imaging Cameras for the Fire Department

To see if the Town of Lyndeborough will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of twenty four thousand dollars (**\$24,000**) for the purchase of up to two thermal imaging cameras. The sum of one thousand one hundred forty two dollars (**\$1,142**) to be raised from general taxation and the balance in the sum of twenty two thousand eight hundred and fifty eight dollars (**\$22,858**), to be received from a Federal Emergency Management Assistance to Firefighter Grant. **In the event that the Town of Lyndeborough does not receive the Assistance to Firefighters Grant this warrant article will be deemed void;** or take any other action relative thereto.

The Selectmen and Budget Committee recommend this appropriation. (Majority vote required)

Article 10: Capital Reserve Fund Change of Purpose

To see if the Town of Lyndeborough will vote to change the purpose of the existing **Replacement 2002 Rescue Vehicle Capital Reserve Fund** to include the *repair* as well as the replacement of that vehicle. If approved, the fund will be named **Repair and Replacement of the 2002 Rescue Vehicle Capital Reserve Fund**; or take any other action relative thereto.

The Selectmen and Budget Committee recommend this article. (2/3 vote required)

Article 11: 2002 Fire Department Rescue Vehicle Capital Reserve Fund

To see if the Town of Lyndeborough will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of thirteen thousand five hundred dollars (**\$13,500**) to be added to the **Repair and Replacement of the 2002 Rescue Vehicle Capital Reserve Fund** previously established for that purpose; or take any other action relative thereto.

The Selectmen and Budget Committee recommend this appropriation. (Majority vote required).

Article 12: Capital Reserve Fund Change of Purpose

To see if the Town of Lyndeborough will vote to change the purpose of the existing **Replacement 2002 Mack Truck Capital Reserve Fund** to include the *repair* as well as the replacement of that vehicle. If approved, the fund will be named **Repair and Replacement of the 2002 Mack Truck Capital Reserve Fund**; or take any other action relative thereto.

The Selectmen and Budget Committee recommend this article. (2/3 vote required)

Article 13: 2002 Highway Department Mack Truck Capital Reserve Fund

To see if the Town of Lyndeborough will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of twenty-two thousand dollars (**\$22,000**) to be added to the **Repair and Replacement of the 2002 Mack Truck Capital Reserve Fund** previously established for that purpose; or take any action relating thereto.

The Selectmen and Budget Committee recommend this appropriation (Majority vote required.)

Article 14: Capital Reserve Fund Change of Purpose

To see if the Town of Lyndeborough will vote to change the purpose of the existing **Replacement of the 2007 One-Ton Truck Capital Reserve Fund** to include the *repair* as well as the replacement of that vehicle. If approved, the new fund will be named **Repair and Replacement of the 2007 One-ton Truck Capital Reserve Fund**; or take any other action relative thereto.

The Selectmen and Budget Committee recommend this article. (2/3 vote required)

Article 15: 2007 Highway Department One-Ton Capital Reserve Fund

To see if the Town of Lyndeborough will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of thirty four thousand dollars (**\$34,000**) to be added to the **Repair and Replacement of the 2007 One-ton Truck Capital Reserve Fund** previously established for that purpose; or take any action relative thereto.

The Selectmen and Budget Committee recommend this appropriation (Majority vote required.)

Article 16: Capital Reserve Fund Change of Purpose

To see if the Town of Lyndeborough will vote to change the purpose of the existing **Replacement of the 2009 One-Ton Dump Truck Capital Reserve Fund** to include the *repair* as well as the replacement of that vehicle. If approved, the new fund will be named **Repair and Replacement of the 2009 One-ton Dump Truck Capital Reserve Fund**; or take any other action thereto.

The Selectmen and Budget Committee recommend this article. (2/3 vote required)

Article 17: 2009 Highway Department One-Ton Capital Reserve Fund

To see if the Town of Lyndeborough will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of twelve thousand dollars (**\$12,000**) to be added to the **Repair and Replacement of the 2009 One-ton Dump Truck Capital Reserve Fund** previously established for that purpose; or take any action relative thereto.

The Selectmen and Budget Committee recommend this appropriation (Majority vote required.)

Article 18: 2007 Backhoe/Loader Capital Reserve Fund

To see if the Town of Lyndeborough will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of twenty thousand five hundred dollars (**\$20,500**) to be added to the **Repair and Replacement of the 2007 Backhoe/Loader Capital Reserve Fund** previously established for that purpose; or take any action relative thereto.

The Selectmen and Budget Committee recommend this appropriation (Majority vote required.)

Article 19: 2008 Volvo Dump Truck Capital Reserve Fund

To see if the Town of Lyndeborough will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of nineteen thousand dollars (\$19,000) to be added to the **Repair and Replacement of the 2008 Volvo Dump Truck Capital Reserve Fund** previously established for that purpose; or take any other action relative thereto.

The Selectmen and Budget Committee recommend this appropriation (Majority vote required.)

Article 20: Capital Reserve Fund Payment of Expenses

To see if the Town of Lyndeborough will vote, pursuant to NH RSA 35:9-a-II, to authorize the Lyndeborough Trustees of the Trust Funds to pay for capital reserve fund investment management services, and any other expenses incurred, without further action of the town meeting, from capital reserve funds income. No vote by the town to rescind such authority shall occur within five years of the original adoption of this article; or take any other action relative thereto.

The Selectmen and the Trustee of the Trust Funds recommend this article. (Majority vote required)

Article 21: Safety Services Complex Study Committee

To see if the Town of Lyndeborough will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to appoint a committee to study the feasibility of building a Safety Services Complex or other options and to determine the best location for said complex or other options, the committee to consist of not less than seven (7) nor more than nine (9) members to study the current and future space needs and to determine the best location for the Lyndeborough Fire, Police and Emergency Management Departments. Committee members to be registered Lyndeborough voters, chosen for their professional expertise and community experience. Said committee, to report annually to Town Meeting, as to the progress to date. The Fire Chief, Police Chief, Highway Agent, Emergency Management Director or their designee will serve as ex-officio members of said committee. It is expected that this committee will present a final report to the voters no later than the Town Meeting of 2018; or take any other action relative thereto.

The Selectmen recommend this article. (Majority vote required)

Article 22: Establish a Capital Reserve Fund for a Safety Complex

To see if the Town of Lyndeborough will vote to establish a Capital Reserve Fund for the study of the location and construction of a safety complex or other options for the Lyndeborough Fire, Police and Emergency Management Departments and appropriate the sum of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000) for this Capital Reserve Fund and to further appointment the Board of Selectmen as Agents to Expend from this account; or take any action relative thereto.

The Selectmen and Budget Committee recommend this appropriation (Majority vote required)

NB: This unusual request for the Board of Selectmen to act as agents to expend comes from their belief that at some time this committee will need to consult with experts/professionals on this task and such activities would be properly paid for from this account. The only way to accomplish this without March Town Meeting vote is to designate the Selectmen as “Agent”.

Article 23: Estimated Tax Impact to be Placed on Warrant

To see if the Town of Lyndeborough will vote, in accordance with NH RSA 32:5,V-b, to require that the annual budget and all special warrant articles having a tax impact, as determined by the governing body, shall contain a notation stating the estimated tax impact of the article, or take any other action relative thereto.

The Selectmen recommend this Article. (Majority vote required)

Article 24: Chase Road Complete Discontinuance

To see whether the Town of Lyndeborough, pursuant to the authority in RSA 231:45-a, will vote to discontinue the road described in Warrant Article 4 of the annual town meeting of 1958, said road being therein described as ‘... *leading from the gate of the (Perham Corner) cemetery to the four corners near Joseph Rudis ...*’, said roadway being situated completely on property shown on the current Town of Lyndeborough Tax Maps as Lot 025-000 on Tax Map 247, being further depicted on said tax map by a dotted line entitled ‘Chase Road R/W’, leading southwesterly from the westernmost end of the cemetery (Lot 026 on said tax map) to Perham Corner Road, so that any right which the Town has in and to said roadway as well as any public servitude to which said roadway is subject will be vacated. The intent of this article is to insure that title to the fee interest in the land under said roadway be hereafter unencumbered by any interest of the town; or take any other action relative thereto.

The Selectmen recommend this article. (Majority vote required)

Article 25: Acceptance of Reports

To see if the Town of Lyndeborough will vote to authorize the Selectmen to accept the reports of auditors and committees as printed in the Town Report; or take any other action relative thereto.



Report of the Budget Committee 2014



This year's budget is relatively flat. If you pass the operating budget as currently constructed, the result will be an increase of 44 cents to the town portion of the tax rate. This increase is offset by a 23 cent decrease in the Capital Reserve Fund expenditures. This results in approximately a 21 cent increase or less than 1% on the town portion.

Highlights of the operating budget increases include a 2% cost of living increase for town employees. There is also increased wages for the Police and Selectmen's offices due to last year's new hires having to be accounted for the entire budget year. The Highway Department has increases in overtime wages and outside vehicle maintenance. Maintenance costs are up because we are sending the grader out for a major scheduled overhaul. As I sit here looking out the window, it is easy to see why overtime is up substantially. There is also an increase in Assessing due to this being the last year in the cycle and the extra time involved in preparing valuations for tax bills. Government Building Safety is up due to money allotted for alarms in Center Hall, the Center Shed and Highway building.

Warrant Articles are mostly routine funding of Capital Reserve Funds. There is a request for \$40,000 to be added to the 1984 Tanker Capital Reserve Fund. The next Warrant Article calls the purchase of a replacement vehicle subject to the receiving of a FEMA Firefighter's Assistance Grant. There is also a request via Warrant Article for money to fund Mountain Road Engineering. This is the first step in the repair and rebuilding of four sections of the road. This expense will be funded from existing fund balance and will not affect your 2015 tax rate.

Revenues are relatively flat and are estimates at this time. In the fall, when the actual tax rate is calculated, these numbers will change slightly.

I want to thank all the department heads, the Selectmen, the town office employees and my fellow Budget Committee members for their good work on the town budget. I also want to stress that this budget makes it possible to responsibly fund our current obligations and future needs. I hope to see you all at Town Meeting.

Report of the Capital Improvement Committee

2014



The Capital Improvement Program is overseen by the Planning Board who appoints members to the committee. This financial planning tool has been in place since 1985. It is the process of reviewing the capital needs of the town and school and developing a savings and spending plan so as to minimize severe swings in our capital costs. The overall goal of the plan is to fund these needs in a way that, from year to year, results in a minimal impact on the tax rate. One of the chief financial tools used to accomplish these results are Capital Reserve Funds or CRFs. These voter established funds allow money to be set aside in an interest earning account so sufficient funds will be available for a specific capital purchase/project. These funds are managed by the Trustees of Trust Funds and cannot be co-mingled with any other monies. Additionally, no funds may be withdrawn until you vote to do so at Town Meeting. The other primary funding tool is called bonding. A bond is like a home mortgage in that it is paid off over time with payments that include both principal and interest. This approach is used when funding by a CRF is impractical given the size expense or timeline involved.

The CIP Committee meets with each department that has major capital needs. The Selectmen review each town department request and the Consolidated School Board prepares the one for the school. The Committee creates a plan that attempts to keep the bottom line total to be spent over the six years of the plan as level as practical. It is our hope that this approach will give voters the confidence to approve the capital spending items on the warrant without the fear doing so will cause the tax rate to spike upward. Approval also avoids the ancillary problem where things don't get funded but the need remains causing too many costs to come due at once resulting in a tax rate spike. When you step back and total all the buildings and pieces of equipment we have plus the roads, the infrastructure values are substantial. The CIP Committee's task is to keep this infrastructure working for the citizens of the town at a cost that is affordable.

Here are a few remarks to help explain what is taking place with the various account categories in the plan.

Fire Department: Each truck is listed with a proposed date for replacement. In general, the life of a truck is around 28 years. The plan lists what is expected to be the replacement price with a CRF amount sufficient to provide the funds that will be needed by the replacement date. The '84 tanker has given us over 30 years of service but is fortunately in good enough condition to give us several more years. The plan was to retrofit the plastic tank onto a new chassis. It has become a challenge to find a design that allows the truck to fit into the station. A new truck will cost considerably more than what has been set aside. If necessary, we believe the current truck will continue to serve us while we place \$40,000 in the CRF for another 5 years allowing the purchase. A long shot option is to request a federal grant to cover the additional \$200,000 we need. The grant application has been submitted. The '94 pumper will be an expensive replacement so money is going into the fund now even though a 2022 replacement date is called for. The substation concept placeholder reminds us that as the town grows, a second station in Lyndeborough Center may make sense. No funding is anticipated within the 6 year window of the plan however. The Rescue Truck CRF continues with replacement planned for 2017 as does a CRF for the '05 pumper replacement.

Police Department: The police vehicle rotation is based on moving from one sedan and one four wheel drive to two four wheel drive vehicles. These would be of the Ford Explorer size. Based on the expected annual mileage in these future years and the desire to replace between 90-100,000 miles, a four-year cycle is planned. The 2011 will be replaced in spring of 2016 but final funding is to be approved in 2015. It best fits the CIP schedule to do so and allows the vehicle to be ordered in January of 2016 for delivery in May. The plan shows funding of each vehicle over the last two years of its four year life and includes the cost of replacement light bars, radios, etc. in case those also need to be purchased.

Highway Department: The equipment needs of the department are based on the concept of two two-man crews available to work separate projects at one time. Given when equipment needs to be replaced and its cost, CRFs are being funded in 2015 for all but the 2008 Backhoe replacement, that begins in 2016, and the grader CRF because we placed twice the normal amount in the plan last year. The only CRF amount change is for the 2007 one-ton. It has been increased from \$13,500 to \$34,000 to allow us to purchase a heavier duty vehicle. One point about the two backhoes in the plan, most Highway Departments have a loader; we do not. The '07 backhoe, bought used, is a large machine and given the size of the bucket can serve as our loader plus handle larger backhoe jobs. The backhoe purchased in 2008 is a smaller machine and is more practical for many jobs plus it supports the two two-man working crew concept. Thus Lyndeborough has a grader and two backhoes while most town highway departments have a grader, a loader, and a backhoe.

Selectmen: The current plan has no spending items for the Selectmen's office. They have decided, however, to ask for permission to form a facilities committee to assess whether a new combination safety complex should be considered for the future.

Ambulance: The ambulance service is now a part of the town of Wilton governance rather than being independent. With this change it has been decided Lyndeborough will place some funds for an ambulance replacement as part of its annual operating budget allocation for sharing the service with Wilton. Given this change, there is no longer a need for an ambulance CRF.

Schools: The "school bond committed funds" listing at the bottom of the plan worksheet page is for the ongoing CO-OP bond being funded within the school operating budget. That bond's last payment will be in 2020. Meanwhile voters last year approved the School Board's proposal for a bond to pay for a major renovation/new construction project at FRES plus some work at LCS. With the elementary grades 1-5 moving to Wilton, LCS would house kindergarten and allow the SAU to move there from currently rented space. The School Board asserted that through various operating budget savings, the amount Lyndeborough is to pay toward the bond will be cost neutral thus nothing is in the CIP for this project.

Infrastructure: Road Improvement is a category that will see fluctuating funding over the life of the plan. As the town grows, certain roads will need to be improved to safely accommodate the increased traffic on them. Mountain Road has received almost no attention over the years and has a number of fairly serious problems the scope of which are beyond the capabilities of our Highway Department. The Selectmen have elected to seek the assistance of an engineering company to help identify what should be done and the cost. An article for this engineering work will be on the March warrant for around \$60,000. A very rough estimate for the actual work has been included in the plan for \$500,000 to be bonded over 15 years. Also, bridge replacements will be required from time to time, typically under a state Bridge Aid program that requires 20% of the funding from the town. The future CRF amounts in the plan are for the two large culverts on Pettingill Hill road. Right now the focus is on the culvert on Johnson's Corner Road. Funds showing as already raised are for this project. A FEMA grant may be approved but if not we believe the \$135,000 (the Town's share of the cost under the FEMA program) will fund a more modest "box culvert" instead of a true bridge with FEMA funding.

Police Space: Work on an architectural design and cost analysis for additional police space at Citizens Hall has been done but needs further refinement. Because a new committee is to evaluate future space needs for both police and fire, the plan has a possible addition being funded via a bond starting in 2017 but much more work and discussion is still required. This is simply a placeholder until a firm direction is decided upon.

The bottom line CIP total (see “YRLY CIP SUBTOTAL” line) is relatively level and that is what we want. Years, 2008-2012, saw reduced spending for the capital plan in light of the economy. This six year plan calls for reverting to spending levels very close to those prior to 2008 which prevents a ballooning of costs going forward.

The CIP Committee would like to thank the Selectmen and the Department Heads for their assistance in preparing the CIP for 2015-2020.

Department Reports

Report of the Assessor 2014



In 2014 approximately 250 properties were visited as part of an ongoing five-year cyclical database maintenance program. In addition there were roughly 100 properties visited that had outstanding building permits or had ongoing construction as of April 1, 2014. These properties were adjusted accordingly. There were 6 abatement requests filed and processed for the tax year 2013.

The Assessments in Lyndeborough proved to be somewhat above "Market Value" in 2014. There were 23 qualified sales submitted to the New Hampshire Department of Revenue Administration to derive the 2014 assessment ratio. The 2013 estimated weighted mean assessment to sale ratio is 109.0% +/- . The median assessment to sale ratio is 108.0%. At this time we have not received the 2014 Equalization Ratio but will post on the Assessing page of the town website when we receive it.

Currently the assessments are based on the 2010 market value. The next scheduled town wide revaluation will be conducted in 2015. Please be watchful for a notice of preliminary 2015 values in the late summer.

I would like to thank you for your continued cooperation.

Building Permit Fee Schedule

FEE CALCULATION:

New construction; both residential and commercial, is based on the sum of all the gross horizontal areas of all floors of the building. This includes basements and garages. Attic floors are not included in this calculation unless they are designed for habitable rooms at a future date. Building permit fees are inclusive and include plumbing, mechanical and electrical inspections.

New Residential \$0.25 per square foot **New Commercial** \$0.30 per square foot

Manufactured Housing or storage (all types) \$0.25 per square foot.

Additions to existing structures, including attached garages will be calculated in the same manner.

Unattached structures such as garages, barns, sheds, etc. will be calculated @ \$0.25 per square foot.

Renovations will be calculated by the square footage of the areas affected, e.g. a kitchen renovation fee would be based only upon the square footage occupied by the new design. Renovations not involving structural change will be charged according to the following fee schedule:

Demolition Permit- A demolition permit is required, and is available with no fee charged. Depending on the structure, however, it may be necessary to evaluate the building for the presence of lead paint or asbestos. The State of NH has stringent requirements regarding the removal and dumping of these materials. Information is available at Town Hall regarding these procedures.

Work requiring a permit without payment of a fee:

1. A permit shall be obtained for any repair, alteration or similar activity that includes any structural changes, plumbing, wiring or the creation of new space.
2. The Building Inspector should be contacted to discuss the extent of the project. He will determine if a building permit is necessary.
3. If the Building Inspector is aware of work being done without a permit being issued, the Building Inspector has the right to examine the project and determine the permitting required.

The Board of Selectmen, upon advice of the Building Inspector, may reduce or increase the building permit fee relative to the complexity of any project whose cost is in excess of \$1,000.00. In no event will a permit be issued for less than \$50.00.

Report of the Fire Department

2014



In 2014, the Fire Department responded to 122 calls for assistance. Calls break down as follows:

I want to encourage everyone to practice fire safety within their home or business. Take the time to develop a fire safety plan that includes working smoke and carbon monoxide detectors on every floor, at least one working fire extinguisher within the house, and having a written fire safety plan. Please take the time to practice this plan with your kids and family, it really does save lives.

Calls for service were up slightly from 2013. In January we had one major building fire that consumed a mobile home on Avalon Lane. Mutual aid was received from many communities for this incident. Although our records show 4 structure fires for the year, the remaining building fires were kitchen fires that were extinguished upon our arrival. Medical calls were up a bit from previous years and remain roughly 60% of our call volume. Once again, a major weather incident moved through in November, knocking out power to a majority of the town for almost 3 days. Fire, EMS, PD, Highway and Emergency Management grouped together to check on the elderly and residents that might have special medical conditions. Every time these incidents happen, we always learn of ways we can improve the system. One of our goals this year is to get an updated list of residents that either require or would like welfare checks during these significant weather events.

For the most part, this past year the apparatus didn't suffer any significant breakdowns. The 1994 Engine required a complete muffler replacement costing almost \$1000. The 2002 Rescue was towed from a training session due to a loss of the brakes and was repaired for \$600. The 1984 International Tanker, the truck we are trying to replace, required pump work costing \$500. Your fleet of fire apparatus remains in great working condition and gets regular maintenance as required.

The Fire Department conducted a two month free trial of software called "I Am Responding" and by the end of the year had purchased the software based on a very successful trial. Through mobile apps on their smart phones, and a large monitor at the fire station, the officers and members of the Fire Department know immediately who is responding to a call that has been dispatched. During the trial, we found that this type of system alerts the officers and members of the department if we have enough personnel to handle the call, if we need to page for additional help, or even call for mutual aid. This helps especially

during work hours or weekends where staffing may be minimal. Besides the staffing improvements that this helps with, the software also allows us mass messaging within the membership through e-mails and texts for better communication, mapping and dry hydrant marking, apparatus status tracking, and a fully interactive calendar. This type of software will definitely help to improve your Fire Department and help us become more efficient.

Through testing our portable radios this past year, it was discovered that many of the batteries were not holding an appropriate battery charge. Because of this, the radios were not capable of sending an “emergency signal indicator”. All of the Fire Department portable radios are equipped with an emergency signal feature that allows the incident command or dispatch to be notified if a firefighter is in distress while at an incident. Once this was determined, all 24 batteries were replaced to bring the portable radios back to a proper, safe working condition. Many thanks to Assistant Chief Brian Smith for researching this problem and getting it corrected with minimal impact to the budget.

The septic tank and septic alarm at the fire station was replaced in August after it was discovered that the old tank had a cracked bottom, allowing ground water to enter. Many questions were answered during this project as far as location of the tank, leach field, and condition of the piping coming out of the station. It was also determined that the Fire Station does not have a leach field, it is just a holding tank. What this does is tell us that we will need to budget additional money (as you will see in the 2015 budget) for septic tank pumping. This is a precaution due to the unknowns of how many times it will actually need to be pumped during the course of the year.

With much help from Town Administrator Russ Boland, Lyndeborough Fire has applied for two Assistance to Fire Fighter Grants offered by the Federal Emergency Management Agency. These grants were written to replace our old and tired thermal imaging camera, as well as replace our 30 year old 1984 International Tanker. The current thermal imaging camera is over 12 years old and we are starting to have trouble finding replacement batteries and places to have it serviced. The Thermal Imaging grant is for \$24,000, with the Lyndeborough portion to be raised by taxation at \$1,142. Our hope is to replace the old camera with two new cameras, placing one in each engine. This year we discovered we cannot re-cab and chassis the old tanker (as originally planned) because the newer commercial cab and chassis are built taller due to the new emission control equipment put under the hoods. With a station that already has tight height restrictions, this put us at a disadvantage of finding a cheaper solution to this problem. Two of the three truck manufacturers that we met this past year advised that they could build a custom tanker that would fit into our current station, but it would drive up the cost a lot higher than anticipated. For the tanker grant, Lyndeborough would contribute 150,000 through our current CIP and the grant would contribute the remaining \$200,000. Hopefully by town meeting, we should have an update on the status of these grants so the appropriate votes can be taken on the 2015 warrant articles. I want to thank Town Administrator Boland and the members of the department that sat on both the truck committee and thermal imaging camera committee.

In April, Lyndeborough Firefighting Intern Jeremy Cavareta passed his State of NH Fire Fighter 1 exam through the Mascenic Regional High School. This successful Fire Fighter 1 program is put together by Program Coordinator Peter Kelleher with assistance from other State Fire Instructors and various surrounding Fire Departments. These youths are being exposed to the same program that all other entry level firefighters go through and are tested at the same level. The course is roughly 180 hours and that includes the classroom time and practical sessions. This is a tremendously successful program that many other high school districts are now trying to emulate and we are happy to be able to benefit from it. Congratulations Jeremy! Nice job!

The Fire Department Auxiliary continues to support us in so many ways, whether it is equipment needs or that hot cup of coffee at 3:00 in the morning on a fire scene. This past year they purchased two new small carbon monoxide meters that are attached to our medical equipment. These meters monitor carbon monoxide levels when EMS providers enter a house to treat a patient. This assists the responder to rule out carbon monoxide poisoning and also monitors the conditions responders are in and will alert them to high levels. These could not have been purchased without the help from the Auxiliary.

We welcomed Town Administrator Russ Boland this year. Since his first day, Russ has been very active with the Fire Department opening well needed lines of communication. Several Fire Department committees were formed to look into purchasing the tanker and thermal imaging cameras; Russ was very active in these meetings and offered advice and assistance. From all of us at the Fire Department, welcome aboard Russ!

The Fire Department association has held several boot drives over the last few years and wants to inform everyone that the money raised has gone to many great uses. Just this past year we have helped individuals that lost their possessions in fires, made donations to food pantries and last year made donations to the Giving Tree here in town. So as inconvenient as the boot drives can be, please remember that every cent raised goes to helping others and buying equipment that is not budgeted for. For those who have donated, many thanks to you for your continued support.

In closing, I would like to thank my officers, staff, members of the Department that give so many hours of their time, the Town Office staff, the Board of Selectmen, the other Town Departments, and of course you, the people of Lyndeborough, who continue to support us.

Report of Forest Fire Warden and State Forest Ranger

Your local Forest Fire Warden, Fire Department, and the State of New Hampshire Division of Forests & Lands, work collaboratively to reduce the risk and frequency of wildland fires in New Hampshire. To help us assist you, please contact your local Forest Fire Warden or Fire Department to determine if a permit is required before doing ANY outside burning. Under State law (RSA 227-L:17) a fire permit is required for all outside burning, unless the ground is completely covered with snow. The New Hampshire Department of Environmental Services also prohibits the open burning of household waste. Citizens are encouraged to contact the local fire department or DES at 603-271-1370 or www.des.state.nh.us for more information. Safe open burning requires diligence and responsibility. 
This past fire season started in early April with the first reported fire on April 7th. April, which is the traditional start to our spring fire season, began very dry with unseasonably dry conditions continuing through the entire month. This dry pattern continued through the first half of May. 80% of our reported fires this season occurred during this six week period. The largest fire was 24 acres, occurring in the town of Tamworth. From mid May through early September, above average rainfall kept our total acreage burned statewide at 72 acres. This is the smallest amount of acreage burned statewide in several years. Late August through late September though brought a dry trend to northern areas, resulting in several deep-burning remote fires. Our fire danger days correlated well with the days that there were fires actually reported. The statewide system of 16 fire lookout towers continues to operate on Class III or higher fire danger days. Our fire lookouts are credited with keeping most fires small and saving several structures due to their quick and accurate spotting capabilities. The towers fire spotting capability was supplemented by the NH Civil Air Patrol when the fire danger was especially high. Many homes in New Hampshire are located in the wild land urban interface, which is the area where homes and flammable wild land fuels intermix. Several of the fires during the 2014 season threatened structures, and a few structures were burned, a constant reminder that forest fires burn more than just trees. Homeowners should take measures to prevent a wild land fire from spreading to their home. Precautions include keeping your roof and gutters clear of leaves and pine needles, and maintaining adequate green space around your home free of flammable materials. Additional information and homeowner recommendations are available at www.firewise.org. Please help Smokey Bear, your local fire department, and the state's Forest Rangers by being fire wise and fire safe!

Report of the Highway Department 2014



Another heavy winter challenged the Highway budget once again this past year.

Our old friend the 1989 Mack dump truck was forced into retirement by Baldwin Hill Rd. The cost was just too high to justify making the necessary repairs. So the truck was sold as promised. This winter we will have to rely heavily on the smaller trucks with the large truck as back up. This issue should be resolved in 2016 when one of the F550 trucks is scheduled to be replaced.

This year we were able to complete many of the projects we had on our schedule. All the paving was completed on the 2nd NH Turnpike and New Rd. Also yellow lines and gravel was added to the roads. Highbridge Rd. was widened and gravel was added to improve the condition of the road. Yellow lines were also applied to the recently paved section of Center Rd. Guardrails were installed on Putnam Hill Rd near Glass Factory Rd and will also be added to other designated locations in town.

This year we plan to have paving work done at the beginning of Mountain Rd (near Badger Pond) and also Center Rd. There are also a number of culverts needing attention and repair/replacement so please use extra caution on our roadways. Please check the website as we will post road closure notices and other updates as necessary.

The declining condition of Mountain Rd has made it necessary to make it a priority in our existing paving plan. Many of the road improvements are accomplished in-house by our road crew but this project requires a more extensive approach which includes surveying, road design, plan preparation, drainage evaluations, geotechnical investigation and report, specification preparation, structural design, environmental evaluation and permitting.

The first step of this process is to request from the 2015 Town Meeting funding for the engineering portion of the project which due to the terrain is essential. The second step will be to request funding from the 2016 Town Meeting to accomplish the needed reconstruction of portions of Mountain Rd. A copy of the Request for Proposal is available for viewing at the Selectmen's Office.

Report of the Police Department

2014



Well, it is hard to believe that it has been over a year since I was appointed as Chief of Police in Lyndeborough and I want to say thank you for all the assistance that I have received from the Board of Selectmen, Town Administrators, both Burton Reynolds and Russ Boland, and the other department heads. As the old saying goes it takes a village to raise a child! One of the attributes to working in the Town of Lyndeborough is the fact that we all work together in order to provide the best possible service to the community and its citizens.

In December of 2013 I was elected as the President of the Hillsborough County Police Chief's Association and I took office in January 2014. This has provided me the opportunity to work directly with other Chiefs, not only from Hillsborough County, but from around the entire State of New Hampshire. I was re-elected to this position in December 2014 for another term of one-year.

The department has gone through some changes during the past year. First off the agency did some hiring. Richard Sprankle was hired in February 2014 at 24 hours a week, as a part-time Sergeant. Sgt. Sprankle brought over 30 years of police experience with him from the Nashua Police Department, where he retired as a Lieutenant, unfortunately, Sgt. Sprankle was injured in a work related incident while working for the Peterborough Police Department and he has been out of work since July 2014. Sgt. Sprankle brought a great amount of experience to the agency and was instrumental in assisting with the hiring of our new full-time Officer, Eric MacDuff. Officer MacDuff was hired in March 2014 and over the summer he completed the 164th NH Police Academy in Concord, New Hampshire. Officer MacDuff has been working solo patrol since October of 2014 and has proven to be a tremendous asset to our organization! Also brought on board in February was, Michael Chapdelaine, as a part-time officer. Officer Chapdelaine is a full-time certified officer and works full-time for the Peterborough Police Department as a Detective Sergeant. In March 2014 Officer Jennifer Weston was hired part-time and she is also a full-time certified officer and works full-time for the Greenville-Temple Police Department. This was one of the primary goals of 2014, to get the department up to staff and to provide qualified and experienced officers for your agency and I am happy to report that we have been very successful!

Training and staff development continue to be a large part of department philosophy. In October of 2014, I attended the International Association of Chiefs of Police Conference. The conference was a week long and allowed me to obtain executive law enforcement training for small rural agencies. Some of the things that I learned at this conference have already been implemented by the department. In December 2014 I attended the New Hampshire Chiefs Winter Conference and received updated information from around the state and training on the new Attorney General's Protocols on photo line ups and show ups. A model policy was also provided and we are in the process of developing it for our use.

Part of our community policing philosophy that we have in place, is our Facebook page at; <https://www.facebook.com/#!/LPDNH> please check out the page and click, "like it" in order to receive information that we post. We also subscribe to Nixel and you can sign up at <http://www.nixle.com>. Nixel is a good resource of information for other surrounding communities as well as ours. It sends you alerts on safety, traffic, and events, via text message or e-mail directly to your cellular phone, so you can plan in the event of an emergency or traffic delay accordingly.

Our calls for service were slightly up in 2014 at 387, compared to the 358 calls in 2013, our motor vehicle stats for 2014 show that we stopped 565 vehicles down from the 1,001 in 2013. Our arrests have fallen from 23 in 2013 to 14 in 2014. The difference is due to some enforcement grants that the agency completed in 2013 that we did not participate in for 2014. Motor vehicle accidents stayed the same for the year at 12. The New Hampshire State Police responded to 38 calls for service in the town of Lyndeborough in 2014. A majority of these calls were medical assists, accidents, and alarms, with two arrests for motor vehicle crashes for DWI and two arrests being made at domestic disturbances.

As always, we look forward to attending community events in 2015 and participating with the youth of the community through our efforts with the school district and our participation with other youth organizations.

In closing, I would like to encourage the citizens of Lyndeborough to subscribe to Nixle and our Facebook page and assist our organization in getting word out to the public. By doing this the department can respond better to the needs of the community and assist citizens more effectively. Our staff will strive to make the community of Lyndeborough, New Hampshire, a safe place to live. All of our officers are dedicated to this and they will do everything in their power to demonstrate it to you each and every day. We are grateful for the support you have given to us and would like to acknowledge the fact that without your support, we would not be as effective in our strategies to make the Town of Lyndeborough a safer place to live. Report of the Town Administrator

2014



I would like to open my report by thanking the Board of Selectmen, taxpayers of Lyndeborough, and my fellow co-workers for their guidance and confidence since becoming your town administrator in July, 2014. Over the last eight months, we have been able to accomplish a great deal and increase the return on investment for the taxpayers of Lyndeborough.

Examples of this progress include:

- The successful bidding of the engineering required for the reconstruction of Mountain Road
- Completely painting Citizens Hall instead of only two sides, which resulted in a \$2,500 savings
- The installation of a complete security system at the library and connection of the existing fire alarm to the fire department
- Increasing communication by re-establishing monthly department head meetings
- Establishment of seven emergency lanes throughout town to increase the ability of emergency services to reach remote areas
- Adoption of a snow ordinance that will make the removal of snow more efficient
- Registering Lyndeborough in the Federal Service Award Management System (SAM) to allow the community to file grants with the Federal Government
- Applying for Assistance to Firefighter Grants totaling \$224,000
- Bidding the computer services supplied to the town and awarding the bid to a new company, saving approximately \$3,000
- Bidding the propane required to heat municipal buildings, saving approximately \$5,500
- Forming an area administrators group in order to exchange ideas
- Updating the town-wide paving plan
- Updating the 2015-2020 capital improvement plan
- Building, reviewing and presenting the 2015 municipal budget
- Increasing visibility and communication with the public and team development

I stress that the above accomplishments are the result of a team effort; no one person is responsible for their development or execution. The success we have enjoyed thus far would not have been possible without the tremendous support of all the employees and taxpayers of Lyndeborough. In the years to come, we will continue to strive to provide the best and most efficient services possible to the taxpayers of Lyndeborough, while always being mindful of the costs associated with those services.

Town administrators have many responsibilities, but in my opinion, treating everyone with respect while truly listening to their concerns is the most important, and results in the best outcome for the community. I assure you this is, and will continue to be, my personal policy. In that spirit, I ask that if you have any ideas how we may serve the community better, please contact me.

*Report of the Welfare Department
2014*



“Whenever a person in any town is poor and unable to support himself, he shall be relieved and maintained by the overseers of public welfare of such town, whether or not he has a residence there.”

Our Town Welfare Department has the responsibility to make sure the Lyndeborough residents have the basic needs of life. Examples of need would be shelter, food, utilities, and medically-necessary prescriptions. Where appropriate, expenses necessary for seeking and maintaining full employment may also be provided. The Town may need to assist or make a referral to an applicant if there is an emergency (threat of loss of basic need) or may determine there is a temporary need until employment, State Aid, Social Security, etc. is received. It is not intended to assist residents living beyond basic needs.

All applications for assistance are personally reviewed to determine eligibility, using the Welfare Guidelines established by the Board of Selectmen. These guidelines assure that the statutory requirements are met while also protecting Town tax dollars. We require each applicant to give full disclosure of their financial position with accompanying documentation and all information is verified to determine eligibility. Assistance is provided by voucher and payment is only made directly to vendors of basic needs and no cash assistance is given to clients. The Town is also able to place a lien on all real estate property if a welfare client is a property owner. By vigorously referring applicants to other relief agencies for assistance, we reduce the amount of financial impact on the town.

Welfare expense in 2014 decreased from 2013. Five families received assistance during the year.

Report of the Cemetery Trustees

2014



During 2014, there were 9 internments: 5 full burials and 4 urns, all in the South Cemetery. Many families are now opting for cremation for their loved ones. Several urns can be placed in one full lot, and urn-specific lots are available at a lower cost. For those whose ashes have been scattered elsewhere, a memorial stone may be placed on a family plot with no Town fee. Everyone should have their name on a stone somewhere, if only to state, "I was here."

Years ago, the State acquired a number of properties for a flood control project, now known as Putnam Pond, and deeded a 10.3 acre parcel of excess land to the Town, to be used for cemetery and recreation purposes. The Trustees are about to implement a plan for expanding the South Cemetery into this parcel, and the first step is to clear one area and selectively cut the rest. The proceeds of this timbering should pay for stumping and leveling for gravesites.

To complement our efficient zero-turn-radius riding mower we have purchased a walk-behind mower with the same capabilities. This will allow maneuvering around stones more easily and reduce the need for hand trimming.

In 2014, we contracted with Medlyn Monument to repair and straighten the stones in the Perham Corner Cemetery. We plan to perform similar repairs in the Dolliver Cemetery in 2015.

Fred Douglas generously gave his labor and materials to replace the flagpole in the Center Cemetery with one donated by Kent and Betsy Perry. It's gratifying to live in a town where residents see a need and so readily step up to take care of it. Thank you, Fred, Kent and Betsy!

Again, we thank Greg Porter, who conscientiously maintains our eight cemeteries. We are also grateful to Kent Perry and the members of the Highway Department, who not only perform openings and closing of graves, but also assist Greg and perform other cemetery chores.

Report of the Conservation Commission

2014



The Conservation Commission is responsible for assisting in the protection of the natural resources of the municipality and providing a forum for environmental concerns. To accomplish this, part of what we do is review DES permit requests, provide feedback to the Board of Selectmen and town committees and assist landowners in meeting their conservation goals. Conservation funds come from receiving a portion of the penalty paid by developers taking land out of the Current Use program.

In 2014 we sought to become a more active commission. Cindi Hasty suggested that we organize a town-wide roadside clean-up as there had not been one in over five years and we ran with it. Participation was good and many bags were filled and many large items were cleaned up which had been cluttering the landscape for years. Thank you everyone who helped!

There were no major expenditures from the conservation fund, and no major income. However we were in process over the year with landowner David Milton and Ian McSweeney of the Russell Foundation towards helping to support the permanent protection of the Fitch Orchards (Formerly Woodmont Orchards) along Center Rd, so that one of the signature landscapes of Lyndeborough would stay essentially unchanged for future generations and remain open to farming, wildlife and the enjoyment of the public. If approved by the selectmen in 2015 our initial monetary pledge would leverage much larger matching funds and enable us to hold the easement for the town.

The Lyndeborough Natural Resources Inventory that was completed six years ago may be viewed at Citizen's Hall and is available for circulation in book format from the town library. It is also available as two PDF files on the Conservation Commission page of the town website. You'll find it loaded with interesting data, great finds and full color maps of our town.

If you are interested in learning about conservation easements and protecting your property for future generations, we are here to help. We work very closely with other organizations to complete conservation projects. Two of our local partners are the Russell Foundation and the Piscataquog Land Conservancy (PLC). The Russell Foundation provides technical expertise and funding grants that enable us to take on projects that we otherwise could not afford. The PLC is located in New Boston and holds easements on over 5000 acres in this area and has been instrumental in protecting and supporting many properties in Lyndeborough. We are very fortunate to have both of these organizations available because without them most projects would not have been completed.

The Conservation Commission meets on the second Thursday of each month at Citizen's Hall (and Center Hall during summer months) at 6:30pm. We currently have openings and if you are interested in serving, please contact us.

Report of the Heritage Commission

2014



The Commission met regularly during the year. Clayton Brown was named a full member. Several members and alternates are still needed.

The first phase of the “Old House Project” was completed: all existing houses listed in the 1905 history have been documented and photographed and more information on owners, extensive renovations, and just plain stories, is being sought. Stephanie Roper will present a program on the project to The Gatherers.

The Commission met with the newly formed Significant Trees of Wilton and Lyndeborough and voted to support their objectives: educating people on the value of trees, listing all memorial trees in town, and designating trees in town termed “significant” by residents.

Historic markers were made for Lyndeborough Center and will be installed as weather permits. A sign on the hall notes the three memorial maples while a sign near the flagpole describes the Meetinghouse on one side and the Center Village on the other. The marker for 2015 will honor the glass factory. “Welcome to Lyndeborough” signs for Route 31 are being considered.

Work continued on the Village Common with more brush clearing.

The Commission agreed to seek a grant to repair the 100-year-old hand painted backdrop at the Town Hall. Members are working with town Administrator Russ Boland.

Scott Roper created an interactive video of the history of Brandy Brook Road through a program called “Story Maps.” It is hoped to use the program in other parts of town.

The Commission has expressed concern about preservation of various mill foundations, dams, and cellar holes. There is also a need for a good road map of the town.

The old Citizens’ Hall clock was relocated and repaired. Members continue to supply displays for the Town Office cabinet. Suggestions for displays are welcome.

Report of the Selectmen

2014



In 2014 the Board of Selectmen, support personnel, town employees, volunteers and all those who served on the various Boards were extremely busy with their commitment to the citizens of Lyndeborough. The main focus was to strive to enhance the quality of life for all citizens of the town which was demonstrated by their unselfish commitment of time and dedication in their positions to this community. The goals and achievements could not have been met without them. We would like to take this opportunity to acknowledge and thank Burton Reynolds. While our previous full-time town administrator was out on medical leave and while going through the hiring process to fill this full-time position, Burton Reynolds was hired in the interim as the town administrator. His dedication and commitment did not go unnoticed and we sincerely thank him for his expertise.

After a structured hiring process for the vacant position of town administrator the Board of Selectmen evaluated all candidates with some input from employees. At the conclusion we made a conditional offer to Russell Boland who accepted the position. Russ Boland came to Lyndeborough with many positive attributes and started his employment in July. Russ worked with Burton Reynolds during the transition period in order to get him familiar with his job responsibilities and the town. Since being employed he has successfully taken on many required projects within the position, has enhanced and streamlined them which have been extremely positive. Russ has fostered a “team” approach philosophy with the entire workforce and all board members he interacts with that serve this community. This has been very well received by the employees and all those involved. The Board of Selectmen established a clear “chain of command” where his responsibility is to keep the elected board members informed and all department heads report directly to him and not the board. This is unprecedented and we welcome and support this change as your elected officials.

The board has worked very hard with the town administrator, department heads and budget committee members in order to propose a reasonable operating budget for the upcoming year. We have tried to balance the needs of the community with the ability of the taxpayers to afford their respective property taxes. There are several challenges ahead of us as a community that must be addressed; however a reasonable and common sense approach is required to overcome the issues. We must keep in mind that the town portion of the tax rate is only one portion that makes up our tax rate. We all must be mindful that the town's operating budget, Capital Improvement Plan, proposed warrant articles, town revenues and land/building evaluations are only a few pieces of what makes up our tax rate. There are many factors to consider such as the recycling center, ambulance, and schools. Again this coming year, as was done last year the board is proposing to encumber town funds in order to reduce this year's proposed operating budget.

One major decision the citizens of the town are being asked to consider at the March town meeting is a warrant article that requests funding for engineering services/costs for Mountain Road. This article is one of those “challenges” that we spoke of above. This road is in critical need of major repairs in several areas and a complete asphalt binder and overlay. Any citizen wanting to review the proposal from the engineering firm selected (NorthPoint Engineering, LLC) may contact the town administrator Russ Boland. This is very important so please be informed and vote.

We would like to acknowledge all town employees for their hard work and commitment to their respective job responsibilities and job well done throughout the year. We want to especially thank two

employees that we feel have gone above and beyond through some trying times. When it was most needed employee Cindi Hasty took on many additional tasks throughout the year, clearly exceeding her normal job requirements. The amazing thing is that Cindi completed the tasks not only in a timely fashion but with her accommodating, polite and professional manner that only she can display. Very much appreciated Cindi!

The second employee to be recognized is Louise Dwyer who rounds out the “team” in support of the town administrator and the board of selectmen. Louise has done an outstanding job throughout the year making the appropriate adjustments to the financial and other town records. Great job Louise! To all the other employees; your dedication and hard work has not gone unnoticed and each one of you is a credit to this community.

Finally we would like to acknowledge and thank all the citizens, elected officials and citizens who have served and are currently serving on specific boards and volunteers that make the Community Day, Apple Festival, Veteran's Day and fund raising events so successful. Report of the Supervisors of the Checklist *2014*



The Supervisors of the Checklist oversaw three elections in 2014: town elections in March, state primaries in September, and the general state election in November. The turnout was typical in that the first two elections had a pretty low turnout with a higher turnout for the November election. We had little-to-no turnout for our state-mandated supervisor sessions, a meeting that seems anachronistic in our modern computer age, but we show up nonetheless.

The supervisors continued to maintain the checklist with as much accuracy as possible, adding those who were qualified to vote in the town and purging those who no longer lived in town. We continue to have about 1,200 registered voters in Lyndeborough, a number that has remained relatively consistent for about a decade.

2015 should be a quiet year in terms of elections, so we are planning on updating and improving our filing system during this summer. The state mandates the retention of copious amounts of paper records and they have been piling up of late. Our goal is to have clear and accurate records on all voters, both in the state computer system and within our paper records, so that any questions regarding the eligibility of any voter on the checklist can be solved in a quick and easy manner. That way, we can gear up for a busy year in 2016, with the hectic presidential primary in January, town elections in March, the state primary in September and the always busy presidential election in November.

Report of the Zoning Board of Adjustment

2014



The Zoning Board of Adjustment hears and decides appeals if it is alleged there is an error in any order, requirement, decision, or determination made by an administrative official in the enforcement of any zoning ordinance according to NH RSAs by the town. It also may authorize, upon appeal, in specific cases such variance from the terms of zoning ordinance as will not be contrary to the public interest, if owing to special conditions, a literal enforcement of the provisions of the ordinance will result in unnecessary hardship, and so that the spirit of the ordinance shall be observed and substantial justice done. The Board also grants special exceptions as outlined in the Town of Lyndeborough Zoning Ordinance (paraphrased from NH RSA 674:33)

The ZBA heard one case in 2014

Case #1 - Philip and Virginia Brooks Map 204 Lot 009-000 Location: 202 Pettingill Hill Road Applied for an Equitable Waiver from Section 702.03 due to set back restrictions and from Section 408.00 due to Soil Based Zoning.

Variance was approved

ZBA appeal applications are available on line or by contacting the Town Office. This application form was revised consistent with the law, and it was clarified and made easier to understand.

Value Yesterday. Enhance Tomorrow. Plan Today.

In a region with a long and storied history, the Nashua Regional Planning Commission strives to honor the past and preserve its historic traditions while working to make the region the best possible place to live, work, and play both today and for the benefit of future generations. The NRPC provides comprehensive planning services for local land use, transportation, and environmental planning efforts, and delivers extensive mapping and data assistance utilizing the latest technologies. Membership in NRPC allows communities to access customized services by request as well as resources such as:

- **Transportation Planning:** Grant writing, custom traffic counts and data, transportation modeling, intersection analysis, road safety audits, road surface management system, parking studies.
- **Land Use Planning:** Customized land use board training and materials, draft ordinance and regulation review, special projects and research assistance, fact sheets, guidebooks and educational resources, master plan consultation, and project scoping.
- **Data and GIS Mapping:** Demographic data and analysis, mapping data and standard map sets, GIS community needs assessments, production of annual tax maps and NRPC Live Maps.
- **Environment and Energy:** Group energy purchase for municipal and school facilities, consultation for local Energy Committees, MS4 Permit coordination, household hazardous waste collections.

In 2014, NRPC launched our new website at www.nashuarpc.org. The site is intuitive to navigate and information is easier to find. It promotes understanding about NRPC: our mission, our services, and the value we provide. The site contains a wealth of data resources presented in a modern, creative, and interactive manner to meet the evolving expectations of our communities. For each of our core planning areas, Transportation, Land Use Planning, GIS, and Environment, there are pages that summarize our service offerings with illustrative work examples. In addition, there is a transportation data viewer, a searchable Document Library and new flagship application called Live Maps that allows users to create their own parcel level maps.

In 2014, NRPC provided the following services to the Town of Lyndeborough:

TRANSPORTATION

Traffic Data Collection – NRPC did not collect traffic count data within Lyndeborough during the 2014 counting season. NRPC, does, however, maintain 7 locations in cooperation with NH Department of Transportation to support the Highway Performance Monitoring System. NRPC staff also collected traffic count data at 4 additional locations in 2014 at the request of the Town. Historical data for all locations may be found at <http://www.nashuarpc.org/trafficcount/index.htm>.

Transportation Improvement Program (TIP) – NRPC develops and maintains the TIP so that federal highway transportation dollars are available to Lyndeborough and the rest of the region. Throughout 2014, NRPC carefully monitored the status of Lyndeborough projects in the TIP to ensure that project information and changes initiated by NHDOT were communicated to the Town.

2015-2040 Metropolitan Transportation Plan (MTP) - NRPC develops and maintains the MTP so that federally funded and regionally significant transportation projects can be advanced towards design and construction. The MTP lists multimodal projects over a 25-year planning horizon and is the source from which specific projects are identified, prioritized and selected for funding through the Ten Year Plan and TIP. This is a critical step to ensure federal highway transportation dollars are available to Lyndeborough

and the rest of the region. NRPC is working to advance projects through the transportation planning process which improve accessibility and enhance mobility of Lyndeborough residents.

GEOGRAPHIC INFORMATION SYSTEMS (GIS)

Data Services – NRPC continues to maintain an authoritative digital GIS basemap for the region. In addition to an ongoing program of data maintenance for roads, parcels, zoning boundaries, and conserved lands, NRPC completed a region-wide set of building footprints in 2014, and initiated a project of inventorying existing trail data.

Custom Hard-Copy Maps and Analysis – NRPC continues to provide ad-hoc mapping services. In 2014, NRPC completed a standard map for Lyndeborough with street addresses for use at Town Hall and the Fire Department.

Applications – MapGeo, NRPC’s award-winning Live Maps App, is a public-facing resource for property information in the region. NRPC’s Transportation Data Viewer hosts the most up-do-date traffic counts and transportation project information, in an easy-to-use Google Interface.

Training and Workshops – NRPC hosted the free, instructor-led classroom training, “Introduction to American Factfinder with Thematic Mapping.” We also continued the quarterly GIS Brownbag Lunch Series, an informal knowledge-exchange among GIS users in the region. Geared towards municipal GIS users and open to the public, each meeting features general news and announcements, followed by a guest speaker or open group discussion on a particular GIS project or topic. In 2014 NRPC developed expertise in CommunityViz scenario planning software and presented a regional build-out model to our towns.

LAND USE AND ENVIRONMENT

Electricity Supply Aggregation - NRPC serves as an aggregator to facilitate a bid process among competitive electricity suppliers licensed with the NH Public Utilities Commission. In 2014, NRPC worked with aggregation members to obtain a 9-month competitive electricity supply contract running from February to November 2014. Savings among aggregation members varied based on usage. Individual 9-month savings resulting from the 2014 bid process ranged from \$863 to \$35,201; the Town of Lyndeborough is anticipated to save \$863. Total combined 9-month savings for members of the aggregation are \$165,781 or 19.4% compared to the utility rate.

Hazard Mitigation - NRPC worked with Lyndeborough’s hazard mitigation team to complete the update to the Town’s Hazard Mitigation Plan, incorporating newly obtained fluvial erosion hazard data. The new data documents the causes of erosion and other river movements, identifies property and infrastructure at risk, and determines how areas at greatest risk can be targeted for hazard mitigation opportunities such as culvert replacements or bank stabilization projects. The Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) requires that municipalities update their hazard mitigation plans every 5 years in order to maintain eligibility for federal mitigation grants. Lyndeborough’s Hazard Mitigation Plan Update is complete and is pending formal approval from FEMA.

Selectmen Fred Douglas presented the Boston Post Cane to Lyndeborough's most seasoned resident, Lucy K. Schmidt. She received a standing ovation from her family and Town Residents.

Moderator Walter Holland: There has been a request and a referendum about one of our local town's people, Wally Holt. Wally has written a song for our town called The Song of Lyndeborough and Wally wrote this because he said he wanted to do something for the town that was a positive outlook and has some positive messages for the town. (Played song) May I have a motion to accept this as the official song title of Lyndeborough? Moved by Lee Mayhew, Seconded by several towns people. All in favor signify by saying Aye, all opposed signify by saying Nay. **Article Passes.**

Article 2: To see if the Town of Lyndeborough will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of one million six hundred sixty four thousand eight hundred thirty nine dollars (\$1,664,839), representing the operating budget for fiscal year 2014 as prepared by the Budget Committee. Said sum is exclusive of all special or individual articles addressed; or take any other action relating thereto. *The Selectmen and Budget Committee recommend this appropriation. (Majority vote required).*

Motion made by Selectman Kevin Boette to move article as read, seconded by Selectman Arnold Byam. Budget Committee Chairman Don Guertin gave an overview of the budget.

Selectman Boette: Mr. Moderator I would like to offer an amendment to Article 2.

Moderator: We have a request for an amendment.

Selectman Boette: I wish to amend Article 2 by increasing the legal line, account number 4153 by \$141,494 (one hundred forty one thousand four hundred ninety four dollars) in compliance with a court order issued February 2, 2014 requiring Lyndeborough to pay Wilton this amount due to a 2010 school tax rate error and will be offset by use of the Fund Balance. This will increase the total operating budget from \$1,664,839 to \$1,806,333.

Moderator: I have a motion, do I have a second, seconded by Selectman Byam.

Explanation and discussion followed.

Moderator: We have an amendment to increase the legal budget in this year's budget by one hundred forty one thousand four hundred ninety four dollars. All those in favor of this amendment signify by saying Aye, those opposed signify by saying Nay. The Ayes have it. We are back to the original article as amended. **Article 2:** To see if the Town of Lyndeborough will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of one million eight hundred six thousand three hundred thirty three dollars (\$1,806,333), which represents the operating budget for fiscal year 2014 as prepared by the Budget Committee with the additional amendment. Said sum is exclusive of all special or individual articles addressed. All those in favor signify by saying Aye, those opposed signify by saying Nay. Ayes have it. **Article 2 Passes.**

Article 3: To see if the Town of Lyndeborough will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of twenty thousand dollars (\$20,000) to go toward the Replacement of the 2011 4WD Police vehicle. This will be a non-lapsing appropriation per RSA 32:7 VI and will not lapse until the vehicle is replaced or 2016, whichever is sooner. *The Selectmen and Budget Committee recommend this appropriation (Majority vote required.)*

Motion made by Selectman Byam to move article as read, seconded by Selectman Douglas.

Moderator: Any questions? Ready for the question? Read Article. All those in favor signify by saying Aye, those opposed signify by saying Nay. The Ayes have it. **Article 3 Passes.**

Dear Members of the Board:

We have audited the financial statements of the governmental activities, each major fund, and aggregate remaining fund information of the Town of Lyndeborough for the year ended December 31, 2013. Professional standards require that we provide you with information about our responsibilities under generally accepted auditing standards as well as certain information related to the planned scope and timing of our audit. We have communicated such information in our letter to you dated January 28, 2014. Professional standards also require that we communicate to you the following information related to our audit.

Significant Audit Findings

Qualitative Aspects of Accounting Practices

Management is responsible for the selection and use of appropriate accounting policies. The significant accounting policies used by the Town of Lyndeborough are described in Note 1 to the financial statements. As described therein, the Town changed accounting policies related to financial reporting by adopting Governmental Accounting Standards Board (GASB) Statement No. 65, *Items Previously Reported as Assets and Liabilities*, in 2013. The nature of reporting terminology differences from the prior year are described therein.

We noted no transactions entered into by the Town during the year for which there is a lack of authoritative guidance or consensus. All significant transactions have been recognized in the financial statements in the proper period.

Accounting estimates are an integral part of the financial statements prepared by management and are based on management's knowledge and experience about past and current events and assumptions about future events. Certain accounting estimates are particularly sensitive because of their significance to the financial statements and because of the possibility that future events affecting them may differ significantly from those expected. The most sensitive estimate affecting the Town of Lyndeborough's financial statements was:

Management's estimate of the allowance for uncollectible taxes is based on historical data and information known concerning the assessment appeals. We evaluated the key factors and assumptions used to develop the allowance for uncollectible taxes in determining that it is reasonable in relation to the financial statements taken as a whole.

The financial statement disclosures are neutral, consistent, and clear.

Difficulties Encountered in Performing the Audit

We encountered no significant difficulties in dealing with management in performing and completing our audit.

Corrected and Uncorrected Misstatements

Professional standards require us to accumulate all known and likely misstatements identified during the audit, other than those that are trivial, and communicate them to the appropriate level of management. Adjustments proposed and approved were primarily of a routine nature which management expects the independent auditors to make as part of their year-end procedures. These adjustments in the general fund represented a net loss totaling \$2,182,152.

The government-wide financial statements were prepared by the independent auditors and likewise were approved by management. This practice is consistent with previous years.

Disagreements with Management

For purposes of this letter, a disagreement with management is a financial accounting, reporting, or auditing matter, whether or not resolved to our satisfaction, that could be significant to the financial statements or the auditor's report. We are pleased to report that no such disagreements arose during the course of our audit.

Management Representations

We have requested certain representations from management that are included in the management representation letter dated February 3, 2015.

Management Consultations with Other Independent Accountants

In some cases, management may decide to consult with other accountants about auditing and accounting matters, similar to obtaining a "second opinion" on certain situations. If a consultation involves application of an accounting principle to the Town's financial statements or a determination of the type of auditor's opinion that may be expressed on those statements, our professional standards require the consulting accountant to check with us to determine that the consultant has all the relevant facts. To our knowledge, there were no such consultations with other accountants.

Other Audit Findings or Issues

We generally discuss a variety of matters, including the application of accounting principles and auditing standards, with management each year prior to retention as the Town's auditors. However, these discussions occurred in the normal course of our professional relationship and our responses were not a condition to our retention.

Tax Collector Software

In our review of reports from the Tax Collector's software, it was identified that properties that have been deeded, abated, or owned by the Town, are incorrectly included on reports listing uncollected property tax balances. This creates confusion and additional work to properly track uncollected balances owed to the Town. We recommend that management contact the software company's technical support to aid the Town in removing erroneous amounts from the Town's uncollected reports.

Expenditure Testing

As a result of our expenditure testing, we identified two instances in which the purchase order was created after the expenditure incurred, and one instance in which an invoice was not paid timely. We recommend that purchase orders be completed prior to an expenditure being incurred, and we also recommend that all invoices be received directly by the Town offices to ensure timely processing and payment.

Other Matters

The Governmental Accounting Standards Board (GASB) has issued several pronouncements that have effective dates that may impact future financial presentations. Management has not currently determined what, if any, impact implementation of the following statements may have on the financial statements:

GASB Statement No. 67, *Financial Reporting for Pension Plans*, issued in June 2012, will be effective for the Town beginning with its fiscal year ending December 31, 2014. **GASB Statement No. 68, *Accounting and Financial Reporting for Pensions***, issued in June 2012, will be effective for the Town beginning with its fiscal year ending December 31, 2015. The guidance contained in these two Statements will change how governments calculate and report the costs and obligations associated with pensions in important ways. They replace the requirements of Statements No. 27 and 50.



GASB Statement No. 69, *Government Combinations and Disposals of Government Operations*, issued in January 2013, will be effective for the Town beginning with its fiscal year ending December 31, 2015. This statement establishes accounting and financial reporting standards related to government combinations and disposals of government operations that have been transferred or sold.

GASB Statement No. 70, *Accounting and Financial Reporting for Nonexchange Financial Guarantees*, issued in April 2013, will be effective for the Town beginning with the fiscal year ending December 31, 2014. The objective of this statement is to improve accounting and financial reporting by governments that extend and receive nonexchange financial guarantees.

GASB Statement No. 71, *Pension Transition for Contributions Made Subsequent to the Measurement Date – an Amendment of GASB Statement No. 68*, issued in November 2013, will be effective for the Town beginning with its fiscal year ending December 31, 2015. The objective of this statement is to address an issue regarding application of the transition provisions of the Statement No. 68, Accounting, and Financial Reporting for Pensions, and is required to be applied simultaneously with the provisions of that Statement.

Other Matters

With respect to the supplementary information accompanying the financial statements, we made certain inquiries of management and evaluated the form, content, and methods of preparing the information to determine that the information complies with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America, the method of preparing it has not changed from the prior period, and the information is appropriate and complete in relation to our audit of the financial statements. We compared and reconciled the supplementary information to the underlying accounting records used to prepare the financial statements or to the financial statements themselves.

Restriction on Use

This information is intended solely for the use of the Board of Selectmen and management of the Town of Lyndeborough and is not intended to be, and should not be, used by anyone other than these specified parties.
